We will then be serving drinks and some finger food which will provide an opportunity to network with your colleagues, Institute members and others.



Library Read & Publish agreements: New Publishers

Publishers joining for 2024 include: Association for Computing Machinery (ACM); American Psychological Association (APA); John Benjamins Publishing (focusing on linguistics and related fields); Brill (Humanities, Social Sciences, International Law, & selected sciences). Flinders affiliated authors can now publish Open Access articles with no article processing charges (ACPs) with a total of 18 publishers including: Elsevier, Oxford University Press, Sage, Springer, Taylor and Francis, and Wiley.

Not all titles from these publishers are included with each publisher deciding which journals will be covered. A complete list of included journal titles can be found <u>online</u>. Each publisher will set different conditions of access; details for each publisher can be found via the Library's <u>website</u> in conjunction with information from publisher's websites and the <u>CAUL</u> guidelines.

Know your metrics!

Using Citation Metrics can help in many ways, from understanding your impact in your field to identifying significant voices in your field of research or study, to choosing where to publish for greatest impact, and of course in university rankings. Citation metrics play a pivotal role in grant applications, assessment, and promotion evaluations. Staying well-informed about your metrics and mastering key platforms in advance will simplify the process when promotion or grant applications are on the horizon. Metrics can be produced for an individual researcher, for a College or the University as a whole.

HDR Spotlight on Yeling Shen

We would like to introduce Yeling Shen, a PhD student in Education. Her thesis is titled *Meaning in life and academic procrastination of Chinese ordinary and vocational high school students.* Yeling is preparing for her upcoming Confirmation of Candidature.

What's the overview of your thesis?

My research focuses on academic procrastination among adolescents, particularly among ordinary and vocational high school students in southwest China. By examining their tendency for academic procrastination, prevalence rates, and demographic characteristics, I aim to gain deeper insights into their perceptions of academic procrastination, its antecedents, and the perceived consequences. Additionally, I integrate the comprehensive psychological concept of the meaning in life with academic procrastination, exploring potential relationships between them. Through this research, I hope to provide valuable insights for high schools in southwest China, especially vocational ones, to enhance students' academic well-being and reduce procrastination by incorporating meaning-oriented approaches into school-based and life education programs.

What is something that you have enjoyed during your program?

My nearly year-long learning journey here has been incredibly enriching and fulfilling. Firstly, I am deeply impressed and appreciative of the vast array of learning resources provided by the school. Secondly, my tutor has been instrumental in offering unwavering support, encouragement, and expert guidance, fostering a genuine passion for my academic pursuits. This has facilitated the organic development of my academic thinking and habits, a process that has been both challenging and immensely rewarding. Lastly, the school's cultural and natural surroundings create a serene and conducive environment for learning. I find great joy in spending time on campus, where I can fully immerse myself in my studies, whether it be in the comfort of my office or within the walls of the library.

What has been the biggest challenge?

Having solely accumulated practical work experience over the past decade and lacking systematic academic thinking and skills training, I initially found myself feeling somewhat overwhelmed upon returning to campus to delve into detailed academic research once again. The sheer volume of fundamental knowledge needing supplementation, coupled with my constraints on time and energy, posed a significant challenge. However, I am fortunate to have supportive tutors and access to the school's comprehensive services and resources. With their strong backing, I am bolstered with confidence, determined to overcome any obstacles, and successfully complete my studies, ultimately achieving tangible results.

What advice do you have for someone starting their HDR study?

I think my suggestions primarily revolve around two key points. Firstly, immerse yourself completely in the challenging yet profoundly meaningful journey of doctoral study. Avoid dispersing your time and energy on trivial matters or fleeting pleasures with short-term benefits. Secondly, engage actively in exchanges and idea collisions with individuals from diverse backgrounds. This not only enriches your understanding of your own subject but also fosters the skills necessary to become an independent researcher in the future.
